ABOUT TRAINING



Central Detective Training Institute, Jaipur conducts training for the Police, Judiciary, Prosecution and Prison Officers belonging to Rajasthan, Gujarat, MP, Maharashtra, Bihar, Delhi, Haryana, Goa and Daman & Diu (Primarily as Client States) with Police officers of other states, UTs and CAPF personnel on the courses related to different topics. Organizations of States and UTs are allotted 2 to 8 seats in each course and if needed more seats for the same are catered in respective year. During Training year 2023-24, CDTI Jaipur took approval from the BPR&D headquarter for conducting 78 courses which include Workshops, Webinars, and Outreach Program. Out of 78 courses 38 courses are related to Center of Excellence. Some of the courses are conduct online and remaining courses in Offline mode. After training need analysis, more specific courses have been added in training year 2024-25. This Institute is conducting long term as well as short term courses which deals with the investigation and various aspect of Smart Policing. The Institute conducts short term courses of three days, one week, two weeks duration on various topics of contemporary interest concerning modern days Policing, Cyber Crime & Cyber Law program including some mandatory courses on Mobile Forensic, Juvenile Justice, Wild Life Crime, Crime against Women & Children, Women Safety, Investigation of Cyber Crime, Bank & Plastic Card Fraud, and awareness program related to Cyber Crime. From the month of December 2023 onwards, Training of Trainers courses on newly inducted Criminal Laws viz. BNS, BNSS and BSA 2023 are being conducted. 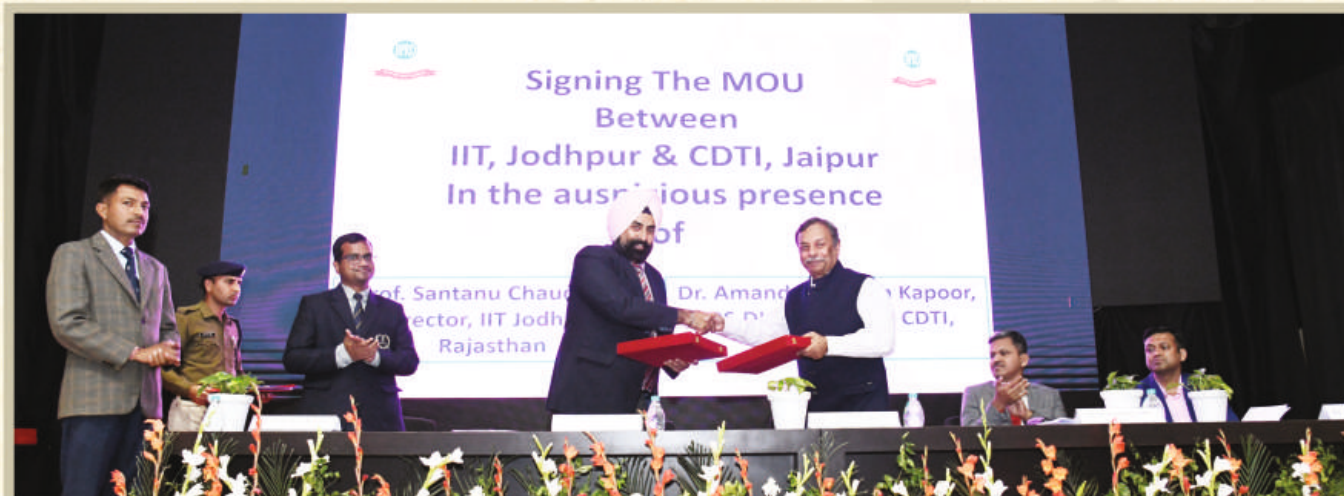






Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed between CDTI, Jaipur and IIT Jodhpur regarding Technology Mission.

TIME FOR DIGITAL NAKABANDI

With guerrilla tactics increasingly employed by hackers and cyber-prowlers, it is time for “Digital Nakabandi”. Nakabandi being the tactical term for access control and area domination by law enforcement authorities. CERT-In, along with CSIRT-Fin, recently issued a whitepaper on Application Programming Interface (API) security. This should give boost to digital Nakabandi.

APIs facilitate seamless data Exchange between applications. In the dynamic digital sphere, APIs are integral or innovation. Particularly transformative in finance, they empower banks to enhance customer experience and create revenue streams. Though the API architecture has revolutionised development cycles, it has Also increased the vulnerabilities. Given India is pacing towards a largely digital economy-in which API is the mainstay of the sharing mechanism - the whitepaper has to be swiftly executed.

The Union government's E-Governance initiatives like the Open Government Data (OGD) platform have over 5 lakh resources, 12,000 catalogues and over 1 lakh APIs. Then, there is the policy on open Application Programming Interfaces that sets out the government's approach to the use of open APIs to promote software interoperability for all e-governance applications. API Setu, launched in March 2020, aims to bring all the APIs from the centre to a single place and make them available for consumption by government departments and industry.

The National Data and Analytics Platform (or NDAP) is NITI Aayog's flagship initiative that hosts datasets from across India's vast statistical infrastructure. The National Data Governance Policy, slated to be introduced, is seminal to the India Datasets Programme for non-personal



data, ensuring safe access for research and innovation. It aims to have standard APIs and other technology standards for whole-of-government data management. At present, there is no model data-sharing toolkit to help chief data officers in managing risk associated with the sharing and release of data sets. As a result, many data cells are reluctant to share data sets.

Against such a backdrop, one goal is to ensure secure connections and protect the back-end systems, keeping the source code hidden from partners while linking various systems. Imagine APIs as digital keys granting access to your virtual doors, maintaining an API inventory is akin to having a record of your keys. Strong authentication mechanisms like the use of token-based authentication to securely manage access tokens, securely managing and storing API keys, conducting security assessments and regularly updating response plans to efficiently address and mitigate the impact of potential API attacks are some norms for API security.

As API attacks grow in complexity, traditional rules-based security falls short. As of now, a person can access an API any number of times from one IP or ID. Therefore, many data breaches have this route of data aggregation through excessive exposure and then misusing it. The digital Nakabandi, hence, must include implementing rate-limiting to distribute the allowed number of search requests evenly over time and tying request limits to user authentication. If the search involves sensitive or resource-intensive data, one might need to set lower request limits. Also, there is a need to implement rate-limiting to restrict the number of requests from a single user or IP address to prevent attacks.

Organisations must turn to artificial intelligence (AI) driven security, leveraging machine learning to analyse unique user behaviours. Analysing the typical search behaviour of one's users, with AI-based models, is a must. Factors such as device, call timing, and authentication details are considered, enabling the system to differentiate norm.

PRIORITIZING MENTAL HEALTH IN POLICE FORCES

India's law enforcement agencies are facing a crisis, concerning to health issues, like stress, trauma, exhaustion, depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and there is a reluctance to seek assistance due to stigma. Factors such as working hours and exposure to unpredictable/ tough events worsen these challenges.

The impact goes beyond individual's health, affecting safety and straining family relationships. It is essential to prioritize being not just out of empathy but also to ensure effective policing and better performance. Reforms should focus on addressing stigma establishing support systems and promoting a culture of resilience within police departments to enhance law enforcement efforts and maintain justice.

Current State of Mental Health: In police departments, personnel face challenges when it comes to receiving health support due to systemic issues and limited resources. While some departments do provide services like counseling and peer support, they often struggle with funding and a

shortage of trained staff. Additionally there is a stigma attached to health concerns that deters officers from seeking assistance fueled by a culture that values toughness. The existing hierarchical structures within the departments hinder communication and the lack of access to mental health professionals further complicates efforts to offer support especially in smaller departments. To enhance support for personnel's well-being, it is essential to prioritize efforts to reduce the stigma associated with health issues secure more funding for comprehensive services and cultivate an environment that encourages open dialogue and peer support. Tackling these obstacles is vital, for bolstering the resilience of police personnel and improving overall policing efficiency.

Challenges and Stigma: The stigma surrounding mental health in the police force presents significant challenges to officers' well-being and the efficacy of law enforcement. Cultural norms promoting toughness and resilience deter officers from seeking help, while fear of judgment and career repercussions further discourages disclosure of mental health struggles. Hierarchical structures inhibit open dialogue, with officers hesitant to confide in superiors or peers. Additionally, limited awareness and education exacerbate stigma, hindering early intervention efforts. Addressing these challenges requires a multifaceted approach, including destigmatization efforts, cultural change, and improved access to support services. Creating a culture of acceptance and providing education on mental health awareness can empower officers to seek help and promote early intervention. By prioritizing officers' mental well-being, Indian law enforcement agencies can enhance the effectiveness and integrity of policing efforts while fostering a supportive environment for all personnel.



Training and Capacity Building: In order to address mental health challenges among the police force, it is crucial to focus on training and capacity building. Although there are some existing programs, they may not be thorough enough. It is important to enhance police training by incorporating modules on mental health awareness, trauma-informed care, and techniques to build resilience. Continuous professional development should prioritize mental health training for officers of all levels, customized to their individual needs and obstacles. Peer support networks and mentorship programs can offer valuable support and solidarity. The use of technology can improve access to mental health services, particularly in remote regions. By focusing on mental health training and assistance, police departments can enable officers to identify, deal with, and overcome mental health issues by creating a culture of strength and assistance which is crucial for successful policing.

Community Engagement and Support: Engaging with the community is vital in tackling mental health issues within the police force. Partnering with mental health experts and local organizations can help increase awareness, lessen stigma, and offer necessary support services for officers and their families. Workshops, outreach programs, and collaborations with nearby clinics provide education and opportunities for counseling and peer support. By including community input in the planning process, the police ensure that they are meeting various needs. Through these partnerships, law enforcement agencies establish a supportive atmosphere that prioritizes the mental well-being and strength of officers, ultimately improving the overall effectiveness of their work.

Policy Recommendations: Policy reforms are very crucial and important to institutionalize mental support mechanism within departments. These are the few recommendations for this. (1) Develop comprehensive policies that remove shame from mental illness and promote open dialogue within law enforcement. (2) Allocation of adequate funding for mental health initiatives, including hiring and training mental health professionals and establishing support services. (3) By integrating mandatory mental health training into police recruit curriculum and ongoing professional development programs. (4) Establishing clear protocols for crisis intervention and de-escalation techniques in situations involving officers experiencing mental health crises. (5) Foster partnerships between police departments, mental health professionals, and community organizations to create a holistic support network. (6) By regularly evaluating and updating mental health policies based on feedback from officers, stakeholders, and mental health experts to address evolving needs.

Also at personal capacity, the police personnel can take care of their mental health by tuning into their emotions and seeking help when they need it. Finding ways to manage stress, like staying active or pursuing hobbies, sports activities are important. Keeping a balance between work and personal life, eating well, and getting enough rest are keys. It's helpful to have supportive friends and family around. INTRODUCTION OF NEW CRIMINAL LAWS IN INDIA: SIMPLE & SYSTEMATIC FOR SECURITY OF CITIZENS

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ABSTARCT

The three New Criminal Laws i.e. Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), Bharatiya Nagrik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) and Bharatiya Sakshya Adhinyam (BSA) which replaced the trio of Indian Penal Code,1860, Criminal Procedure Code,1973 and Indian Evidence Act,1872 respectively were passed by the Lok Sabha on 20th December 2023 , Rajya Sabha on 21st December 2023 and the same attained the President's assent on 25th December 2023. These laws will come into effect from 1st July 2024 according to a Notification by the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) and it's a strong belief of the makers of these laws that it is not a simply a replacement but these laws will completely overhaul the country's criminal justice system which will be evident from the date of enactment itself. These Acts aim to replace the colonial-era laws, transform India's criminal justice system and protect the rights of citizens focusing on Justice over Punishment. The objectives and intent behind the new laws is to deliver justice to all and avoid the ambiguities and delay in future.

INTRODUCTION

Indian Penal Code,1860, Criminal Procedure Code,1973 and Indian Evidence Act,1872 comprehensively defined offences, prescribed punishments, outlined legal procedures, and regulated evidence admissibility in the courts. However, the passage of time rendered these laws partly obsolete, necessitating the enactment of three New Criminal Laws to address emerging challenges like cybercrime, gender neutrality and other such offences which needs a proactive approach to secure the citizens as well as to uphold the rule of law & the integrity of the nation.

So the three new criminal laws were passed with different objects & intent like Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, 2023 is a comprehensive effort to redefine and refocus the Penal Code. BNS has been streamlined and it will now consist of only 358 sections as opposed to 511 sections in IPC, 1860. Offences against women and children, murder have been given precedence. For the first time, 'Community Service' has been introduced as one of the punishments in section 4 of the BNS, 2023. Overall result of the effort is enhancement in the punishment and amount of fine has been increased. With several sections being amended, repealed or added, the law introduces a nuanced approach to offenses, penalizing actions that endanger the sovereignty, unity, and integrity of India. It also addresses contemporary challenges such as terrorism and organized crime, distinguishing between major and petty offenses and prescribing stringent penalties for the former.

Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023 seeks to humanize our criminal justice system and make it more sensitive towards the vulnerable groups. By timelines for investigations, it



aims to make justice more accessible and responsive to the needs of the people. It replaces outdated terminology with a more people-friendly language, reflecting a commitment to a humane approach as well as defined many terms in the Act itself so that the reference of other laws for definitions can be minimized for smooth and speedy functioning. In cases involving heinous offences, the proposed legislation emphasizes the necessity of a mandatory visit by the forensic team. This strategic provision aims to bolster the investigative process, ensuring that a specialized team conducts an on-site examination to collect crucial evidence. By mandating such visits, the legislation seeks to enhance the thoroughness and accuracy of criminal investigations, ultimately contributing to a more robust legal framework centred around contemporary standards of justice.

Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam, 2023 recognizes the growing role of advanced technology in the legal proceedings and tried to pace up with the time and need of the hour. In a contemporary legal landscape where technology plays a pivotal role this particular law recognizes electronic evidence as any information generated or transmitted by any device or system capable of being stored or retrieved. This broad definition encompasses a wide range of digital data, from emails and text messages to multimedia files, acknowledging the diverse forms of evidence relevant to modern cases, emphasizing factors such as authenticity and integrity. This inclusion is crucial in maintaining the credibility of electronic information presented in court, ensuring that technological advancements do not compromise the reliability of legal proceedings. Special provisions for the admissibility of DNA evidence and the acceptance of expert opinions as evidence further bolster the Act's commitment to a modern and effective legal framework.

CONCLUSION

Mere enactment of a new criminal laws and overemphasis on the use of emerging innovative technological solutions will not bring any miraculous change in the Indian Criminal Justice System, if few underlying challenges, like proper interpretation and execution of such laws will not be done keeping into consideration the objectives of these laws. A noteworthy and strong feature in the new criminal law is the establishment of an independent director of prosecution in each district. This significant development aims to fortify the prosecution system, ensuring fairness and impartiality at a local level. Similar progressive legal actions taken within a definite time frame could crucially strengthen the overall criminal justice machinery and build public trust in the evolving justice system. These new criminal laws significantly defines the offences in simple words to avoid any kind of ambiguity, though enhanced the punishment and increased the fine but possess the reformative approach too and for evidences emphasized for on the electronic devices but at the same time uphold the value of time for the dispensation of justice through fair trial. At last, it can be concluded that there is no as such major change is introduced through these new criminal laws which will be enacted from the 1st July, 2024, but it is a simple effort to organize & consolidate the amendments done previously in these laws as well as a step towards the reformation in the Judicial system by adopting the technology including investigation, collection of evidences and trial proceedings too. Let's wait all together to see the societal transformation in the coming years with the enactment of these new criminal laws.

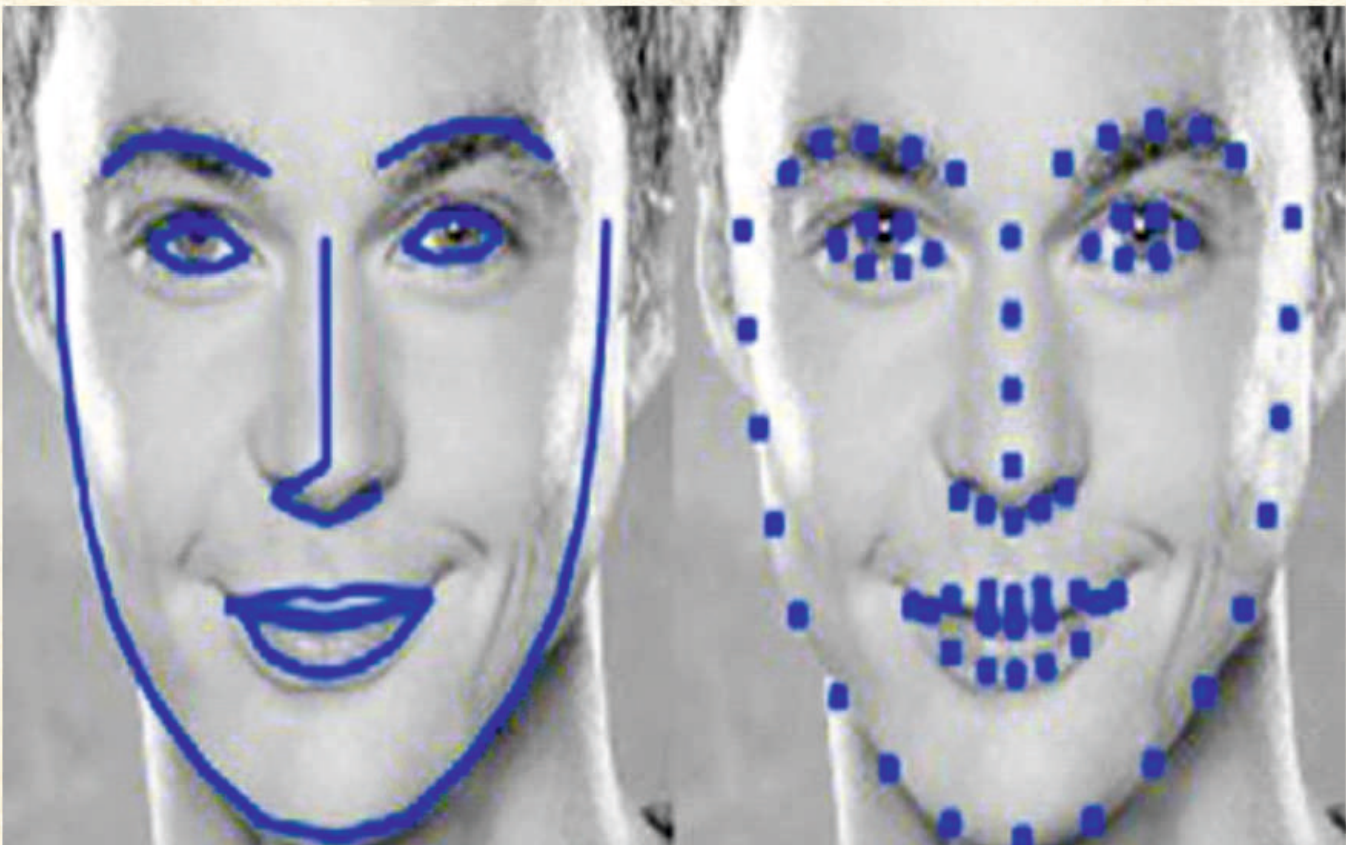
The exponential growth of SIM card-related fraud presents a formidable challenge to law enforcement agencies in India.

Operating on the principle of facial structure analysis, ASTR employs sophisticated techniques to detect anomalies and inconsistencies within live photograph captured during SIM card verification. By meticulously scrutinizing subtle facial features and patterns. Its ability to swiftly detect and weed out fake or forged SIMs before they are utilized for cyber crimes and fraudulent activities represents a significant breakthrough in India's fight against digital malfeasance.

TIPS AND TRICKS FOR MEMORY IMPROVEMENT

Our memories are an integral part of who we are, but it is truth that as our age grows, our memory declines. For many older adults, the decline becomes so serious that they're no longer able to live independently, which is one of the biggest fears, adults have as their age grows. We need to exercise our brain and take care of our body.

As per the researchers, some of the most effective tips and tricks for improving memory are as follows:

- **Learning something new:** - Memory strength is just like muscular strength. The more we use it, the stronger it gets. Learning a new skill is an excellent way to strengthen our brain's memory capacity. There are many activities to choose from, but most importantly, we will need to find something that forces us out of our comfort zone and commands our full attention like: - learn a new instrument, make pottery, play mind games, like chess, learn a new type of dance, or learn a new language etc.
- **Repeat and regain:** - Any time we learn a new piece of information, we are more likely to mentally record that information, if it's repeated. Repetition reinforces the connections we create between neurons. Repeat what we hear out loud. Try using it in a sentence. Write it down and read it aloud.
- **“Grouping” or “break into pieces” information:-** Grouping or break into pieces refers to the process of dividing newly learned information into portions to produce fewer, larger portions of information. For example, we may have noticed that it's much easier to remember a phone number if the 10 digits are grouped into three separate portions (e.g. 982-904-1610) rather than one long number (9829041610).
- **Use all of our senses:-** Another tactic of memory experts is that they don't just rely on one sense to help retain information. Instead, they relate information to other senses, like colors, tastes, and smells.
- **Keep busy:-** A busy schedule can maintain our brain's irregular memory. One study linked busy schedules to better cognitive function. This study, however, was limited by self-reporting.
- **Stay organized:-** An organized person has an easier time remembering. Checklists are one good tool for organization. Manually writing down our checklist (instead of doing it electronically) also increases the likelihood that we will remember what we have written down.



- **Sleep on a regular schedule:-** Go to bed at the same time every night and get up at the same time each morning. Try not to break our routine on the weekends. This can greatly improve sleep quality.
- **Avoid bright screens before bed:-** The blue light emitted by cell phone, TV, and computer screens prevents the production of melatonin, a hormone that controls our sleep-wake cycle. A poorly regulated sleep cycle can really take a toll on sleep quality. Without enough sleep and rest, the neurons in our brain become overworked. They can no longer coordinate information, making it more difficult to access memories. Roughly an hour before bedtime, turn off your devices and allow your brain to unwind.
- **Get physical Exercise:-** Exercising has been shown to have cognitive benefits. It improves oxygen and nutrient delivery to the body, and helps to create new cells in the brain which are essential for memory storage. Exercise especially increases the number of cells in the hippocampus. There's no need for the exercise to be energetic. Walking, for example, is a great choice.
- **Manage stress:-** When we are stressed, our body releases stress hormones like cortisol. Cortisol has been shown to greatly impair the brain's memory process, especially our ability to retrieve long-term memories. Stress and depression have even been shown in animal studies to shrink the brain.
- **Socialize:-** Humans are social creatures. Research shows that a strong support system is vital to our emotional and brain health. One study found that people with very active social lives had the slowest memory decline. Just 10 minutes of talking to another person was shown to improve memory.
- **Meditate:-** Meditation helps improve several mental functions, like focus, concentration, memory, and learning. Meditation may actually rewire the brain and encourage more connections between brain cells.
- **Enjoy nature:-** Getting out into nature is incredibly important for our emotional and physical health. Enjoying nature can even be considered a form of meditation. One study found that a walk in a park improved memory and attention compared to walking in a city. Likewise, daily gardening lowers our risk of dementia by 36 %.
- **Practice yoga:-** A mere 20 minutes of yoga per day significantly improved participants' speed and accuracy on memory tests. Participants performed significantly better on the tests after yoga compared to aerobic exercise.
- **Remove the extra weight:-** Overweight people have less brain tissue. The more overweight we are, the more our brain is likely to shrink and affect our memory.

- **Drinking lot of water:-** Our brain is made mostly of water. Water acts as a shock absorber for the brain and spinal cord. It helps our brain cells use nutrients. So just a small amount of dehydration can have disastrous effects. Mild dehydration has been shown to cause brain shrinkage and memory impairment. Aim for at least eight to ten glasses per day, or more if we are very active.
- **Drink coffee:-** Caffeine has actually been shown to enhance memory and reduce risk of Parkinson's and Alzheimer's disease. But this one comes with a caveat. Having too much caffeine, or consuming it later in the day, can have the opposite effect as it can impair sleep in sensitive individuals.
- **Eat more of these foods:-** Omega-3s play an important role in building brain and nerve cells. They're essential for learning and memory and have been shown to delay cognitive decline. This includes their ability to improve memory and reduce the risk of Parkinson's and Alzheimer's. These diets focus on eating: plant foods, especially green, leafy vegetables and berries, whole grains, nuts, chicken, olive oil or coconut oil, herbs and spices etc.
- **Eat less of these foods:-** Supporters of the above diets say to avoid the following foods: sugar, processed foods, butter, red meat, fried foods, salt, etc. Sugar and fat has been linked to impaired memory.
- **Avoid certain medications:-** While we should still take our medications prescribed by our doctor, remember to follow our doctor's instructions for dietary and lifestyle changes too. Some prescriptions, like statins for high cholesterol, have been associated with memory loss and "brain fog." Losing weight and eating healthier may also play a role in treating high cholesterol. Other medications that might affect memory include: anti-depressants, anti-anxiety medications, hypertension drugs, sleeping aids & metformin.

Conclusion

Our memory is a skill, and just like other skills, it can be improved with practice and healthy overall habits. We can start with a small of above tips and tricks. For example, pick a new challenging activity to learn, include a few minutes of exercise into our day life, maintain a sleep schedule, and eat a few more green vegetables, fish, and nuts etc.

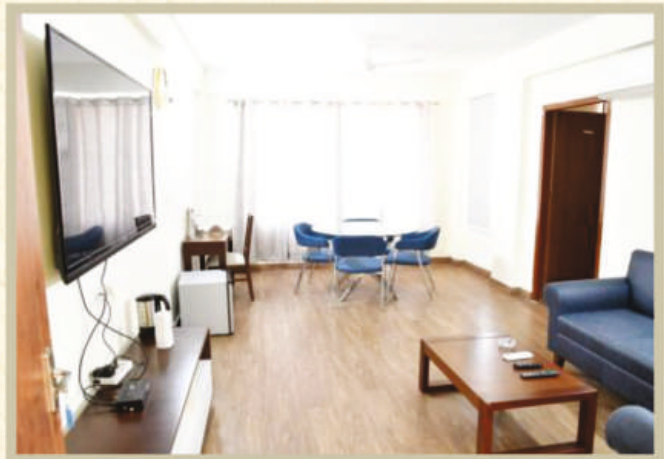
